EVANGELISM TEAMS

For the first time, at least in a number of years, the College had teams in five churches. Armagh, Castlederg, Cavan, Larne and Mullaghmeen were the hosts for a busy week in October. The feedback from the churches and the teams has been very positive.

ARMAGH A major focus of the team's efforts were with the Amazing Journey, a visual



and dramatic presentation of the Bible story, in a number of schools in the Armagh area. Over 1300 children sat enthralled as Rachel Kelly, from Baptist Youth, presented

the life of Jesus and Paul with the aid of the team members. The church have set up a Christmas shop in Keady. Over a two week period it will be used as a point of contact in the town to share the Christmas story. The team delivered flyers to the

People were open to having the team speak about Jesus in different schools as they shared individual testimonies and what they believed. The team also had the opportunity to have fellowship with the Donegal Town Baptist Fellowship, comprising 6 members, and visit door -to-door in the town.





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One of the members of the Fellowship shared how a visit and a video of the Life of Jesus resulted in her own conversion.

LARNE Each morning bright and early at eight o' clock the day began with prayer and devotions, taken by a different member of the team each day. As with most missions, there



were many challenges and surprises as well as fun to be had. The door to door work proved to be the biggest challenge, although there was an opportunity through this to pray with people on their doorstep or to give out a Bible. On one occasion in the local market a Muslim trader also took a New Testament and was keen to hear about faith in Jesus being an answer to his

religious efforts to gain acceptance with God. Some highlights

for the team included sharing their testimonies with a year 12 R.E. class and also with the year 9s encouraging the pupils to be open in debate, even self-professing atheists. Visiting an old people's home and sharing some old hymns with them was another high point for many, as was meeting the wise, retired Pastor Henry.

'Through the course of the week we experienced the protection and love of God. We were challenged by the knowledge that he cares for all the people of Larne; the primary children in the 'catch' club, the older pupils coping with influence from films, Facebook and pop music, self confessed 'back sliders', older people who have endured suffering and doubt, and those in the care home. MULLAGHAMEEN The team worked alongside the church in Enniskillen,



Ballinamallard and Irvinestown distributing the Discovery 4U magazine, as well as in a variety of other activities. Despite the warnings about the Fermanagh weather they never saw a drop of rain! The area that impacted the team most was the opportunity to take three R.E lessons with the year 10 students at a local school. They had been given a question from the Head of R.E. which was 'Why do Christians Believe the Bible - and its relevance for today?' The team had a wonderful opportunity to take, share and explain the truths about the Bible with a question and answer time that followed. They



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were thrilled to hear so many varied questions which they attempted to answer. On one hand statements like 'I don't believe the Bible or religion' to questions about evolution and creation. But the response which totally 'blew them away' was from one year 10 student who said, "I believe in the Bible, so what do I do next?"

'Our week started with the team taking part in both the morning and evening harvest thanksgiving services. The theme for both the services was 'God Provides' which also ran throughout the week in the various activities that the team engaged in.' Stephen Wilson, team leader.

CAVAN During the week the team travelled to several small towns outside Cavan to do door-to-door. They met Nigerians, Russians, Irish, Polish, Sudanese, Ghanaians, Lithuanians and English. There were Jehovah's Witnesses, Muslims, atheists, healers, Catholics and Protestants. There were many opportunities to tell people of how God has the power to change, forgive and transform. At each door a
